ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST WINDSOR ESTABLISHING PROCEDURE FOR THIRD PARTY HIRING OF POLICE OFFICERS AND AMENDING CHAPTER 82 "FEES" SECTION 82-18 POLICE OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE

WHEREAS, the Township of West Windsor permits its police officers to engage in offduty special police work ("extra work"), as is provided for in the "Agreement Between the Township of West Windsor, the West Windsor Police Superior Officers Association (SOA) and West Windsor PBA Local 271 A/K/A New Jersey State Policeman's Benevolent Association Local 271 West Windsor" ("PBA Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Township Council of the Township of West Windsor desire to implement and codify a procedure for the hiring of its police officers to engage in extra work to ensure fairness and efficiency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST WINDSOR, THAT:

Section 82-18 Police of the Code of the Township shall be amended as follows:

## §H. Police Officer Extra Work

- 1. Pursuant to the Superior Officers Association (SOA) Agreement and the PBA Local 271 Agreement, police officers are permitted to engage in "extra work," which is defined as "services in the nature of special or private police duty provided by employees in their off-duty hours to individuals, groups, clubs institutions and others who make payment for such services, and which services the Township is not expected or obligated to provide as a normal police function (e.g. traffic duty, security at private parties or events, club or school dances, football games, etc.)."
- 2. No employee shall be required or compelled to work extra work.
- 3. All requests by prospective employers shall be submitted through the Office of the Chief of Police, or his designee, within the Police Department. The Township may engage a third-party intermediary to schedule extra work assignments for police officers.
- 4. The hourly cost shall consist of a special hourly rate agreed upon by the Township and the recognized collective bargaining units to be paid to officers working extra work assignments, plus a reasonable administrative fee, which covers the administrative cost, overhead and out-of-pocket expenses to the Township for providing the service, including any fees owed to third-party contractors.
- 5. All other details concerning extra work shall be as set forth in the operative Superior Officers Association (SOA) Agreement and the PBA Local 271 Agreement.

Section 2. Repealer. All ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent herewith are repealed as to such inconsistencies.

Section 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

Section 4. The ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication.

- SECTION 1. The improvements described in Section 2 of this Capital Improvement Ordinance are hereby authorized to be undertaken by the Township of West Windsor, New Jersey as General Improvements. For the improvements described in Section 2 there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$445,000.00.
- SECTION 2. The description of the improvements required are as follows:

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR VARIOUS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS IN AND BY THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST WINDSOR, IN THE COUNTY OF MERCER, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$8,437,115 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$7,576,300 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE TOWNSHIP TO FINANCE PART OF THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WEST WINDSOR, IN THE COUNTY OF MERCER, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The several improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby respectively authorized to be undertaken by the Township of West Windsor, in the County of Mercer, New Jersey (the "Township") as general improvements. For the several improvements or purposes described in Section 3, there are hereby appropriated the respective sums of money therein stated as the appropriation made for each improvement or purpose, such sums amounting in the aggregate to \$8,437,115, including two grants expected to be received from the State of New Jersey Department of Transportation in the total amount of \$482,000 for the bicycle and pedestrian improvements and for the resurfacing of Bear Brook Road described in Sections 3(C)(2) and 3(C)(4) hereof (the "State Grants") and further including the aggregate sum of \$378,815 as the several down payments for the improvements or purposes required by the Local Bond Law. The down payments have been made available by virtue of provision

for down payment or for capital improvement purposes in one or more previously adopted budgets.

Section 2. In order to finance the cost of the several improvements or purposes not covered by application of the several down payments and in anticipation of receipt of the State Grants, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$7,576,300 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of the bonds, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

Section 3. The several improvements hereby authorized and the several purposes for which the bonds are to be issued, the estimated cost of each improvement and the appropriation therefor, the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for each improvement and the period of usefulness of each improvement are as follows:

The excess of the appropriation made for each of the improvements or purposes aforesaid over the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued therefor, as above stated, is the amount of the down payment or the State Grants, as applicable, for each purpose.

Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer; provided that no bond anticipation note shall mature later than one year from its date, unless such bond

anticipation notes are permitted to mature at such later date in accordance with applicable law. The bond anticipation notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with bond anticipation notes issued pursuant to this bond ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the bond anticipation notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of the Local Bond Law or other applicable law. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the bond anticipation notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the bond anticipation notes pursuant to this bond ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the bond anticipation notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

Section 5. The Township hereby certifies that it has adopted a capital budget or a temporary capital budget, as applicable. The capital or temporary capital budget of the Township is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this bond ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. To the extent that the purposes authorized herein are inconsistent with the adopted capital or temporary capital budget, a revised capital or temporary capital budget has been filed with the Division of Local Government Services.

Section 6. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

- (a) The improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not current expenses. They are all improvements or purposes that the Township may lawfully undertake as general improvements, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefitted thereby.
- (b) The average period of usefulness, computed on the basis of the respective amounts of obligations authorized for each purpose and the reasonable life thereof within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, is 12.95 years.
- (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the Township as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$7,576,300, and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by that Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$800,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for the purposes or improvements.
- Section 7. The Township hereby declares the intent of the Township to issue bonds or bond anticipation notes in the amount authorized in Section 2 of this bond ordinance and to use the proceeds to pay or reimburse expenditures for the costs of the purposes or improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance. This Section 7 is a declaration of intent within the meaning and for purposes of the Treasury Regulations.

Section 8. Any grant moneys received for the purposes or improvements described in Section 3 hereof shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvements or, if other than the State Grants referred to in Section 1 hereof, to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to this bond ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized but not issued hereunder shall be reduced to the extent that such funds are so used.

Section 9. The chief financial officer of the Township is hereby authorized to prepare and to update from time to time as necessary a financial disclosure document to be distributed in connection with the sale of obligations of the Township and to execute such disclosure document on behalf of the Township. The chief financial officer is further authorized to enter into the appropriate undertaking to provide secondary market disclosure on behalf of the Township pursuant to Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "Rule") for the benefit of holders and beneficial owners of obligations of the Township and to amend such undertaking from time to time in connection with any change in law, or interpretation thereof, provided such undertaking is and continues to be, in the opinion of a nationally recognized bond counsel, consistent with the requirements of the Rule. In the event that the Township fails to comply with its undertaking, the Township shall not be liable for any monetary damages, and the remedy shall be limited to specific performance of the undertaking.

Section 10. The full faith and credit of the Township are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Township, and the Township shall be obligated to levy *ad valorem* taxes upon all the taxable property

within the Township for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

Section 11. This bond ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.
