Overview of Public Health Services

West Windsor Township Health Department provides public health services to the communities of West Windsor, Robbinsville and Hightstown through municipal shared services agreements. West Windsor Township is the primary employer while each community is governed under a separate Board of Health. The services and programs offered reflect mandates established in the Public Health Practice Standards of Performance for Local PII Boards of Health in New Jersey, N.J.A.C. 8:52 and the specific needs of each community. The Health Prevent. Promote. Protect. Department is administered by the Health Officer with the support of the Public Health Nurse, Manager of Environmental Health Services and several Registered Clerical support is provided by full-time Environmental Health Specialists. professionals in the Health Department. In addition, Robbinsville Township and Hightstown Borough designate clerical staff to assist in Board of Health functions such as licensing and vital statistics. Throughout 2018, the professional services of a Health Educator and Clinic Physician were provided by contractual professionals. The West Windsor Health Department provides full time coverage for public health functions to the community and is available for emergency response 24 hours per day, 7 days a week.



The Department is located at 271 Clarksville Road in West Windsor Township. The Health Officer and inspectors perform numerous types of investigations, compliance inspections, meetings, and conferences on a routine basis. The professional staff are licensed by the State of New Jersey and are required to attend trainings regularly to maintain annual continuing education credits on a variety of public health topics.

The Health Department is accountable directly to the Board of Health and to Township and Borough administrations. West Windsor and Robbinsville Townships have Boards of Health which are composed of the members of Township Councils. The Hightstown Board of Health is an autonomous Board composed of volunteer representatives from the community. Members are appointed by the Mayor with advice and consent of Council. The Board of Health makes policy decisions, appoints staff, reviews reports prepared by the professional staff and passes ordinances which are deemed necessary to protect the health of the community. Board of Health meetings are open public meetings and are scheduled periodically throughout the year.

RETAIL FOOD ESTABLISHMENTS

The retail food program licenses and monitors food safety and sanitation at restaurants, schools, markets and churches to ensure food safety and prevent incidence of foodborne illnesses. Unannounced compliance inspections are conducted annually at all Retail Food Establishments for conformity with Chapter 24 of the New Jersey State Sanitary Code. Follow-up inspections are performed when critical



CDC estimates that each year 48 million people get sick from a foodborne illness, 128,000 are hospitalized and 3,000 die.

violations are found during an initial inspection. Establishments which serve vulnerable populations or engage in high risk food preparation are inspected twice a year.

Inspectors also investigate potential foodborne illness reports, outbreaks, and consumer complaints related to food establishments. The Health Department conducts site visits in response to product recalls, power outages, emergency events, and provides specialized educational materials.

Designs for new establishments and plans for renovations to existing businesses are reviewed to ensure compliance with rules and regulations. Inspections are conducted prior to opening and shortly after opening to audit the operational food safety practices. Design reviews involve close coordination with the Construction Code Officials. Grease control measures are also evaluated during the plan review phase in an effort to protect the municipal sewerage systems.

Plan Reviews

Technical plan reviews are conducted of new facilities or renovated retail food establishments. During the plan review process inspectors review design plans and equipment specifications to ensure code compliance prior to construction, remodel or change of ownership. Inspectors work closely with the design professional and construction code officials during this process.

Emergency Response for Retail Foods [3]

Fires, floods, electrical outages and sick food handlers create emergency situations for food establishments serving the public. The Health Department responds 24 hours a day, 7 days a week when a crisis occurs that requires immediate attention in a food establishment. In 2018, 3 establishments required emergency assistance from the department. The incidents involed a fire, non-fire related release from sprinkler system, and complex-wide power outages. During annual visits to food establishments, inspectors encourage operators to establish emergency plans and train employees on best practices for ensuring food safety during events.



ENVIRONMENTAL/PUBLIC HEALTH ISSUES

Inspections and site investigations are performed based upon complaints, referrals and requests from Township/Borough Officials or other government agencies. Local, state and federal regulations and guidelines are utilized to address these concerns. Inspectors apply evidence-based approaches to address substantiated public health problems identified in the community. In addition to investigations aimed at preventing and correcting conditions of public health significance, inspectors assist residents in the resolution of quality of life issues and aesthetic concerns.

The response time and resources invested in resolving these issues varies greatly from case to case and the allocation of resources is dependent upon public health significance. Inspectors may successfully resolve an issue in one or two site visits; however many cases require repeat visits to allow for investigation, documentation, education, and repeat follow-ups to ensure abatement. Habitual, unabated issues or conditions which pose an immediate threat to human health and/or the environment are handled through legal enforcement action in court.

*Hightstown Borough and Robbinsville Township have established property maintenance and housing enforcement programs which are administered by municipal Code Enforcment Officials. The Health Department provides consultative support to these programs upon request.

PUBLIC RECREATIONAL BATHING PLACES

Local health departments conduct safety and sanitation inspections of public recreational bathing facilities to reduce the spread of communicable diseases and protect consumers who use these facilities from harm and danger.

Annual inspections are conducted of all public bathing facilities for compliance with Chapter IX of the New Jersey State Sanitary Code. Seasonal facilities are inspected prior to opening for the summer and during the operational season. Year-round facilities are inspected while in operation. Additionally, laboratory water analysis results are reviewed on a weekly basis. New facilities and renovations planned for existing facilities are subject to a technical plan review and approval process.

POTABLE WELLS AND DRINKING WATER SAFETY

The installation and abandonment of wells are permitted and inspected by the Department to ensure compliance with state regulations. Inspectors often provide consultation to residents in interpretation of lab analysis conducted on private wells and during real estate transfers of property. The inspection and review of a new well is a multi-step process and involves multiple site visits to the property in additional to documentation review. The Department also inspects installation of geothermal wells to help safeguard the integrity of our ground water resources.

ONSITE WASTEWATER DISPOSAL SYSTEM SAFETY



The health department conducts education, permitting, and inspections of low-volume residential and commercial onsite wastewater treatment systems (e.g., septic systems) to ensure that systems are designed, constructed, and maintained properly, thus improving the state's water quality and protecting both human health and the environment. Activities include soil evaluation, investigations, installation inspections, technical design reviews and review of third-party inspection reports for property transfers.

YOUTH CAMPS

Youth camps are inspected prior to operation for compliance with state regulations which address sanitation and safety standards. Inspectors meet with Camp Directors to review records, plans and certifications. The physical components of the camps such as kitchens and swimming pools are inspected for compliance with local and state regulations. In addition, the New Jersey Department of Health periodically conducts operational inspections of youth camps during the season.

BODY ART REGULATION

State regulations require licensing and inspections of establishments performing piercings, tattooing, and permanent cosmetics. There is one (1) body art establishment licensed under Department's service area. RABIES CONTROL PROGRAM

The Health Department is the lead agency for rabies control activities. Rabies is a fatal, viral disease that continues to threaten the health of exposed residents, pets and wildlife in New Jersey. Pet licensing, vaccination clinics, exposure investigations, and educational outreach efforts are strategies used to prevent disease transmission.

Working closely with the Animal Control Officers and the Police Departments, health officials respond to and investigate potential rabies exposures to prevent disease in our community. Confinement notices are issued when a resident is bitten by a dog or cat to monitor the animal for potential illness. Exposures to wildlife require laboratory analysis and follow up. If warranted, exposed individuals are referred for medical evaluation and treatment. Encouraging residents to vaccinate pets and avoid exposures to wildlife are some of the strategies public health professionals employ to protect our communities. Free rabies clinics are hosted by the Health Department four (4) times per year.

Education and prevention are vital components of the rabies program and are ongoing throughout the year. Consultations on animal-related issues and disease control are provided to employees, businesses, volunteers, animal control and residents.

HEALTH EDUCATION/PROMOTION

Health education is part of the job for all staff in the Department and the work is coordinated by a Certified Health Education Specialist. A variety of programs, communications and displays are offered throughout the year on pertinent health topics. Additional materials are generated upon requests from the schools, work places, community groups and the news media. The municipal websites post information on a variety of topics and health promotion offerings in the area. Throughout the year, health advisories and alerts are distributed to partner agencies and shared with the residents when issues arise which may impact community health.

Health education is incorporated into all facets of the health department programming, with a focus on providing education and health promotion services that help the public make informed decisions and encourage a healthy lifestyle. The Department strives to develop relationships with community partners and link individuals with established health and wellness resources. The Health Officer, Health Educator, Registered Environmental Health Specialists and Public Health Nurse attend community events held throughout the year to distribute public health information.

Community Health Improvement Planning

Greater Mercer Public Health Partnership



The Greater Mercer Public Health Partnership (GMPHP) is a collaboration of four hospitals, seven municipal health departments, the Mercer County Department of Health and Human Services, and local non-for-profit organizations whose missions are to measurably improve the health of residents in the greater Mercer County community. The Health Officer and participate on the Board of Directors and Community Advisory Board (CAB).

During the past year, the primary objective of the collaborative was completion of the 2018 Mercer Community Health Needs Assessment. This work involved examination of data on health trends in Mercer County and the gathering of feedback from the community members through interviews with key informants, focus groups and individual surveys. The information collected through this process was presented to the CAB and prioritization sessions were held to identify areas of focus for future health improvement efforts. This work wlll shape the 2019 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) for the greater Mercer County area.

Penn Medicine Princeton Health

In 2018, Penn Medicine Princeton Health completed a separate Community Health Needs Assessment. The local health department encouraged resident participation in completion of the community health surveys to share their views on the current health needs. The health department attended a focus group which included public health partners to share insight from the local health official perspective.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PLANNING AND RESPONSE

The Health Department develops, updates, and exercises preparedness plans for potential public health emergencies. An emphasis is placed on coordinating our plans with a broad range of partners. Plans are integrated with county, state and federal plans to facilitate a strategic, coordinated public health response. In 2018, staff participated in Point of Distribution exercise with fellow municipal and county staff. A Point of Distribution or POD is a large-scale clinic designed to for distribution of medications to mass populations over a short period of time. During public health emergencies, local health departments in Mercer County will work as a coordinated team to implement emergency plans designed to prevent the spread of disease. Community partners are play a key role in the response and outreach efforts continued throughout the year for additional Fixed Facility or "closed POD" partners.

In addition to planning for our response during emergencies, the department helps spread the word to residents and businesses about steps they can take to be better prepared for storms, outbreaks, natural disasters and bioterrorism events. Educational materials are distributed through a variety of venues and staff actively discuss the importance of having plans in place during routine compliance visits to establishments.



PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ACTIVITIES

Communicable Diseases

Communicable diseases are reported to the local health department by physicians, laboratories, hospitals, schools and institutions in accordance with the parameters set forth in the New Jersey Administrative Code, Title 8, Chapter 57. The health department conducts a case investigation, institutes follow-up activities and reports those which meet the "case definition" as defined by the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services. In New Jersey, a web-based reporting system, CDRSS, is used to facilitate information sharing between entities and track reportable diseases. This important function of the local health department helps to prevent the spread of disease by ensuring that residents are followed and counseled through testing, treatment and medical supervision. Public health control measures such as exclusions from school or work, home confinements and preventative prophylaxis are initiated when indicated.

Sexually Transmitted Diseases

Clinics are provided by the Hamilton Township Health Department through shared services agreements which covers patient visits, diagnosis, treatment and contact tracing. Residents of West Windsor, Robbinsville and Hightstown are eligible for free, confidential services.

Tuberculosis Control

Residents testing positive for Tuberculosis (TB) are followed by a nurse case manager at the Mercer County TB clinic operated by the Trenton Health Team under a cooperative agreement between the County of Mercer and the local municipalities. Assessments, consultations, clinic services and transporation are provided by a specially trained nurse case manager. Direct observe therapy (DOT), if prescribed, remains the responsibility of the local public heatlh nurse. During DOT visits, the nurses visits the patient daily at home or work to ensure medication compliance and monitor for side effects.

Immunization Audits

Annual immunization audits are conducted at each educational institution and childcare facility within our jurisdiction for compliance with mandated immunization requirements. During the audit process the Public Health Nurse provides assistance and guidance to ensure compliance with the state-mandated immunization requirements. Preschool, kindergarten and sixth grade student records in both public and private schools are audited for compliance with state requirements. The nurse works closely with facility directors and school nurses to ensure consistent implementation of these policies as well as to educate on the allowance of specific vaccination exemptions.

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Prenatal/Postpartum Referrals

The Health Department occasionally receives referrals from medical professionals concerning high risk mothers and children within our communities in need of prenatal and postpartum services. The public health nurse provides education to parents about the physical, nutritional and cognitive development of infants and plays an important referral role in connecting families to health and social services available to assist the family.

Childhood Lead Poisoning

Childen in New Jersey should be tested for lead exposure at 12 and 24 months of age. Children under the age of six years who have not previously been tested and those under 72 months of age known to be exposed must also be tested. Testing can be coordinated through the Child Health Clinic for uninsured children. Parents are provided with information on ways to reduce their child's potential exposure to lead and the importance of proper nutrition. Lead poisoning prevention materials are also distributed to the general community through a variety of channels to raise awareness regarding the potential exposures in homes and the environment. Children, identified as having elevated blood lead levels, are visited by a public health nurse case manager for follow up counseling. Some cases warrant an environmental hazard investigation which is conducted by a staff REHS specially trained in lead risk assessment and enforcement. Nurse case management services are provided by a registered nurse through a shared services agreement between West Windsor Health Department and the City of Trenton Health Department.

Child Health Clinic Services

The Child Health Clinic is a joint program sponsored by Hightstown Borough, East Windsor and West Windsor Townships. Children without health insurance receive preventative services that address the needs of infants and preschool children. The clinic also provides well visits and vaccinations to school-aged children. The clinic is staffed by contractual medical professionals and the municipal public health nurses. The services include a full physical examination of each child, age appropriate immunizations and screening tests for tuberculosis. At each clinic, visiting parents are counseled regarding growth, development, nutrition and safety. Referrals are made to medical clinics and supportive resources, such as the Women, Infant and Children Program (WIC), blood lead testing and vision/hearing screenings. Robbinsville residents are served by the Hamilton Township Health child health clinic through a separate shared services contract.

Adult Health

Periodic health screenings for adults are offered to the public at events such as health fairs, community gatherings and at regularly scheduled programs at our Senior Centers. Many of these screenings are offered by community partners and coordinated through our Senior Centers. The Health Department provides consultation upon request and helps to link programs with partner agencies. The Public Health Nurse provides blood pressure screenings at a variety of sites within the community to support cardiovascular health awareness. The nurse also offers health information, screenings and referrals for to a variety of health resources available in the community. The nurse works to connect local organizations to connect with agencies that can provide free or low cost screenings. Annual influenza vaccination clinics are offered at the Senior Centers, Project Freedom and Rosehill Assisted Living Community.

The Senior Centers serve as the focal point for adult health services and offer an array of health screenings, lectures, wellness programs and health-related resources by utilizing a variety of partners. Health Department staff consult with the Directors of the Senior Centers and help to link the Centers with additional health resources.

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VITAL STATISTICS

The Registrar of Vital Statistics maintains records of all the marriages, domestic partnerships, civil unions, births and deaths within the community. Each community appoints a separate Vital Statistics Registrar and Deputy Registrar. Each Registrar is required to attend formal training, pass a certification exam and maintain continuing education credits. Robbinsville and Hightstown have appointed the Office of the Clerk to perform this function. The Health Department is responsible for vital statistic services in West Windsor. The high number of death certificates issued in Hightstown is reflective of presence of two funeral homes located in the community.

Looking Forward 2019 Departmental Goals and Objectives

During the 2019 year, the Department plans to:

- Transition from paper-based inspection records to electronic reporting. The selected software program is designed to interface with various departments and to enhance communication within and between Departments.
- Identify and implement a plan to validate the Department's septic and well inventory.
- Implement licensing and educational outreach for electronic smoking device establishments in an effort to reduce youth access and use of vaping products.
- Collaborate with partners across the county through the Greater Mercer Public Health Partnership (GMPHP) to help drive the health assessment and planning processes. The 2019 Mercer County Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) will be released in the spring and identified priorities will be reflected in our local health educational outreach plans.
- Expand wellness promotion in childcare facilities by focusing on train-thetraining programming and offer programs such as NAP SACC and CATCH programs.
- Exercise the Health Department's Risk Communication Emergency Preparedness Plan and address identified gaps and/or weakness by formal revisions to the current plan.
- Establish an ongoing worksite wellness initiative using lesson learned from past programs.
- Increase community resilience and emergency preparedness by:
 - establishing partnerships to assist with educational outreach/response;
 - \circ recruiting additional partners to serve as fixed facilities; and
 - increasing the number of individuals/organization actively monitoring Nixle for emergency communications.
- Increase and enhance our partnerships with community organizations and businesses to increase the number and diversity of resources available to residents.
- Promote the Radon Awareness Program to encourage every homeowner to test and to increase the public's awareness of the potential negative health consequences associated with exposures to radon.
